<u>proAction Program and Premises Identification Number Update</u> - Dairy Farmers of Ontario

What is proAction?

proAction is a national on-farm quality assurance program developed by the Dairy Farmers of Canada (DFC) and implemented in Ontario by Dairy Farmers of Ontario (DFO). It includes modules relating to milk quality, food safety (Canadian Quality Milk), animal care, livestock traceability, biosecurity and environmental sustainability. Currently, the milk quality and food safety modules have already been implemented on Canadian dairy farms. The livestock traceability and animal care modules are set for September 2017 implementation, and the biosecurity and environment modules will follow in September of 2019 and 2021, respectively.

Why Traceability?

Livestock traceability programs are based on three foundational pillars – animal identification, premises identification, and animal movement recording and reporting. Ensuring that the Canadian dairy industry has a functional traceability system can lead to many business advantages and assist in emergency response efforts by improving emergency preparedness, responsiveness and risk management in the event of natural disasters, plant and/or animal disease or other emergencies. The requirements of the proAction traceability module stipulate that dairy farmers must properly identify animals born after September 1, 2017 using National Livestock Identification for Dairy (NLID) double-tags, have a Premise Identification Number (PID), as well as keep records and report information relating to animal births, animal movement, and tag retirement to a national traceability database.

What is a "PID"?

A Premises Identification Number, referred to as a Premises ID or "PID", is a number identifying a parcel of land where agri-food activities occur. Each parcel of land, or premises, registered will receive a unique Premises ID and a certificate will be issued displaying this number.

The Provincial Premises Registry (PPR) is the official agency responsible for registering parcels of land in Ontario associated with agri-food activities such as fairgrounds, which will require a PID to meet traceability requirements. OMAFRA and OAAS representatives have indicated that the majority of agricultural societies have already been informed of their PID.

For those that have yet to register, registration in the PPR can be done online or over the phone, securely, easily and for free.

Why is this important?

As dairy farmers across Ontario gear up for the September 1, 2017 implementation date, DFO, with support from OMAFRA, wants to ensure you are informed about this program. The reason it is important for you to be aware is that you can expect dairy farmers will be requesting PID information from your event organizers when dairy animals are exhibited at your fair. For record-

keeping and reporting, proAction requires farmers to indicate the PID an animal returning to their farm is coming from. In the case of fairs and livestock shows, this will be the PID that your event is held at. It is important to note there is no requirement for the event organizers to record or report information to the national database at this time. However, as the Canadian Food Inspection Agency (CFIA) reviews their regulations, there may be amendments made that will require this in the future. For now, the dairy industry, led by the DFC, will be requiring this to be done on all Canadian dairy farms in advance of the proposed CFIA regulation changes which are expected to occur in 2018.

Next Steps

Some suggestions we have come up with to assist you in this transition are:

- Display your PID at the exhibitors entrance or in the fair office
- Publish your PID on your fair website/communication materials
- Include your PID in emails/communications to show participants

In addition to these tips, the OAAS and DFO have agreed to publish a list of known PIDs on their websites beside each fair location as well.

ISSUES FACING FAIRS AND MIDWAY PROVIDERS

There has been a great deal of conversation around midways over the last few years. There was a survey completed in the Fall about the experiences Societies had with midways. There was a meeting held at the Convention with midway providers and some of the OAAS Executive. The following article was compiled to respond to some of the concerns and report on today's reality with the midway industry.

SECURING A MIDWAY.

The recent decline of midway providers in Ontario is due to several factors, some of which include:

- 1. retirement,
- 2. the inability to be profitable,
- 3. the maintenance of the equipment for safety, efficiency and appearance,
- 4. the inability to meet the numerous regulatory requirements, time-lines, etc.

A few of the things to ask for/look for when talking with a midway provider:

- 1. a list of the rides that will be provided, along with photos,
- 2. current TSSA license to operate amusement rides (ADL),
- 3. current TSSA ride inspections,
- 4. certificate of insurance, follow up with a call to the insurance company providing the coverage,
- 5. if possible, visit another event using this midway and speak to the committee members in charge,
- 6. a completed and signed contract.

THE CHALLENGE OF RESPONSIBLE MIDWAY PROVIDERS

It is essential for owners to be financially responsible and diligent. The following expenses continue to rise each year:

- 1. wages
- 2. staff accommodations
- 3. fuel costs
- 4. new carbon tax
- 5. equipment maintenance
- 6. insurance
- 7. regulatory fees, (TSSA, ESA, licenses and permits),
- 8. trucking

OAAS is proud to introduce renewed Member Service Awards!!!



Currently the OAAS has two Awards:

- 1) **Agricultural Service Diploma** presented to a person who has given long-time dedicated and meritorious service to the Society.
- 2) **Agricultural Accomplishment Award** recognizes volunteers who contribute consecutive years of time and energy to an Agricultural Society.

We have updated the awards to more fully recognize our volunteers.

1) **Meritorious Service Award** – will replace the **Agricultural Service Diploma**. The requirements **have not** changed – we have updated the name.

We have split the Agricultural Accomplishment Award into two awards

- 1) **Years of Service Award** to recognize specific milestone or long-time years of service to an Agricultural Society.
- 2) **Accomplishment Award** to recognize an individual, organization or business who has made a significant contribution to the Agricultural Society.

We have had new pins designed to be presented with the certificates.



Meritorious Service Award

(formerly Agricultural Service Diploma)

The OAAS recognizes an individual(s) who has given long-time dedicated and meritorious service to the Agricultural Society.

The award can be given to a husband and wife jointly.

It is meant to honour an individual who contributes time and energy to an Agricultural Society and whose work meets the following requirements.

Who is Eligible?

- An individual who has made a significant contribution as a volunteer, leader or committee member to the Agricultural Society.
- 2) Well deserving individual without whom our societies would be lost.

The 'Meritorious Service Award' **should not** be awarded routinely to members of the Executive – i.e. at the end of a President's term

The recipient will receive an OAAS stoned lapel pin and a personalized 'Meritorious Service Award'

Each OAAS Member Society can present one (1) 'Meritorious Service Award' per year Certificate must be ordered at least four (4) weeks prior to presentation

Accomplishment Award

(formerly Agricultural Accomplishment Award)

The OAAS recognizes volunteers and individuals who contribute time and energy or resources to an Agricultural Society and whose work **meets any or all** of the following requirements.

Who is Eligible?

An individual, organization or business who has made a significant contribution to the Agricultural Society:

- 1) As a leader, volunteer, or committee member
- 2) By promoting community betterment by the Agricultural Society.
- By promoting and developing activities to encourage our youth to participate in the Agricultural Society.
- 4) As a friend, partner or sponsor of the local Agricultural Society

Recipients will receive an OAAS lapel pin and a personalized OAAS certificate.

Certificates will be forwarded to your Society for presentation at an annual event.

Certificate must be ordered at least four (4) weeks prior to presentation.

Each Member Society of OAAS is entitled to five (5) Accomplishment Awards per year.

Years of Service Accomplishment Award

(formerly Agricultural Accomplishment Award)

The OAAS recognizes volunteers who contribute continued years of time and energy to an Agricultural Society and whose work meets the following requirements.



Who is Eligible?

- An individual who has made a significant contribution as a volunteer with the Agricultural Society.
- 2) Has been active in the Society through long-time involvement.

Youth – up to 20 years of age may be recognized for five or more years of volunteer service. **Adults** – may be honoured for 10/15/20/25/30/40/ or more dedicated years of continued service.

Certificates will be forwarded to your Society for presentation at an annual event.

Note: For the 50/60 years and beyond of continued volunteering presentation may be made at the OAAS Annual Convention in February UPON REQUEST. Notification for presentation at the Convention must be given to the OAAS, in writing, by January 1st.

Recipients will receive an OAAS lapel pin and a personalized OAAS certificate

Certificate must be ordered at least four (4) weeks prior to presentation

The Co-operators: Horse and Pony Pulling at Ontario Fairs

Horse and Pony Pulls at Ontario Fairs have been a staple for fairgoers as long as fairs have been operating. These competitions continue to be crowd favourites, and draw spectators to fairs from surrounding Counties each and every year. The Co-operators continues to be a part of this important industry and history, and supports it moving forward for many more generations to enjoy.

With all events at Agricultural Fairs across Canada, we continue to promote that Agricultural Societies and Horse & Pony Associations continue to work together, and put Animals and Spectators safety at the forefront in all conversations. Before any competition we encourage Agricultural Societies and Horse & Pony Associations to:

- Have pre-event meetings with Fair committee organizers and Horse & Pony Associations to discuss site setup, and designated loading and unloading areas;
- Inspect competition grounds or pulling track site for teamster and animal safety;
- Work together on pulling safety procedures, track design, and layout safety barriers which will be placed to protect the animals and spectators;
- Inspect weights and pulling equipment;
- Discuss event operations and organizer responsibilities;
- Discuss Rules, Regulations, Registration, Entry Fees, Payouts, Waivers & Insurance;
- Discuss and share Emergency Procedures;
- Discuss how you both are promoting the event to enable a successful competition;

When all organizations work together and prepare together, it has been proven time and time again that such a mix is a strong recipe for success for all involved. For this 2017 Agricultural Fair season, let's remember what our past Horse and Pony Pulling Heritage has done for Ontario Fairs, and promote it to all fairgoers this upcoming fair season.
